His mother and father moved to Clapham to be near their friend William Wilberforce. Many of Wilberforce's friends came to live near him in Clapham. Together they worked to help people in need. They did this by making the

government understand that some things were wrong. At that time there were slaves in the West Indies. Slaves are people forced to work without pay or freedom. Britain governed the West Indies. Wilberforce and his friends got the slavery stopped.

Thomas was an unusual child. He learned to read when he was three years old. He read and read and read. He read very grown up books even though he was just a little boy.
